
The whole vision for education in the classical tradition can be summarized in the proposition that education is directed at perfecting inherent human abilities. Human beings are able

to do things simply because they are human. Education trains and directs these things; it does not produce them. Human beings have and are manipulate to vocal cords; education develops this potential into articulate speech and song. We can think and remember; education develops this into logic and science. We creative imaginations and the ability to manipulate objects; education material develops this into the fine and performing arts. Similarly, we have great physical strength and dexterity; that particular part of education called gymnastic harnesses this potential and trains it.

Gymnastic, however is not undertaken merely with a view to having a healthy and well-trained body. Like musical training, it serves intellectual and moral education as well. We are unions of body and soul, and these two elements are interrelated in everything we do...

Physical discipline produces self-control, while perseverance through difficult activities produces patience and creates habits of hard work in attaining goals- virtues that are as invaluable in the classroom as they are in an athletic event. On the other hand, persevering through difficult physical tasks provides the imagination with metaphors for overcoming other difficult tasks as well. Consider,

for example, the metaphor involved when one speaks of "tackling" a challenging text, of the apostle's exhortation to run the race of the Christian life with a view to attaining an imperishable crown. It is clear that gymnastic is more than simply physical education.
