A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Ninth Sunday after Trinity August 13, 2017 through August 20, 2017

Catechesis Notes for the Week— The Sixth Petition—Faith in Christ's Righteousness Brings True Freedom — It is by the gift of Christ's righteousness that we are delivered from every evil. This is why faith continues to pray that God would preserve us in His forgiveness against all evil. Satan's desire is to tempt us away from the free gift of the righteousness of Christ. When our faith moves away from Christ's righteousness, then false belief, despair, and other great shame and vice come into our hearts and lives. So the faith that receives Christ's righteousness is always calling upon Him in prayer to preserve us in the freedom of His righteousness.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week. Use the Lutheran Service Book hymnal. Daily Prayer for Individuals and Families begins on page 294, including simple orders of prayer for Morning, Noon, Evening, and Close of Day.

Jeremiah 7:1-11: What characterized Judah's fall from faith were impenitence and the absence of the preaching of repentance by the priests and prophets of the land. Those few, like Jeremiah, who did call the people to repentance were persecuted, imprisoned or killed. Those who spoke as if all was well in the land were elevated to positions of prominence. The Lord will not have His Word set aside. The call to repentance is necessary. Without it, no one can come to faith or receive the salvation of the Lord.

Romans 9:30—10:4: "Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes." What does this mean? Answer: The Law not only describes and defines love and what is good, but also demands punishment and retribution for those who have transgressed it. "Christ is the end of the law" in the sense that the law finds its "end" or "completion" or "fulfillment" in Jesus and His work. He is the one who is incarnate love and goodness, whose love was ultimately manifested in bearing the punishment of the law for sinners. This is the righteousness of God. Those who seek to establish "their own righteousness" apart from Christ and that which comes by faith are outside the kingdom of God and cannot be saved. Those who believe in Christ have His righteousness, or the "end of the law" in Him.

Luke 19:41-48: Our Lord wept over Jerusalem for the destruction that would soon come upon her. For she did not recognize the time of God's visitation in Christ, who had come to bring her peace (Luke 19:41–48). Through His prophets God had consistently called His people to turn from their deceit and false worship. "But My people do not know the judgment of the Lord" (Jer. 7:1–11; 8:4–12). They sought to establish their own righteousness rather than receive Christ's righteousness through faith (Rom. 9:30–10:4). So it was that God was in His temple to cleanse it, a precursor to the once–for–all cleansing from sin which He would accomplish in the temple of His own body on the cross. God grants us to know the things that make for our peace—His visitation in the Word and Sacraments—that by the Holy Spirit we may penitently confess "Jesus is Lord" (I Cor. 12:1–11).
