A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of All Saints' November 4, 2018 through November 11, 2018

Catechesis Notes for the Week —Praying the Psalms: Psalm 8—Praising the Name of the Lord for His Salvation—Luther declares that Psalm 8 is "a prophecy of Christ—His sufferings, resurrection, and kingly rule over all creatures. This kingdom shall be established by the voice of children, that is, it will be established by Word and faith alone, not by sword or armor." In Psalm 8 David praises the name of the Lord who has set His glory above the heavens precisely because He sent His Son into the world to establish His kingdom through suffering, death, resurrection, and the preaching of the Gospel. Out of everything that God has created and made, mankind is the object of His love and the glorious work of salvation in Christ. In the incarnation, the Son of God is joined to humanity in order to redeem mankind from the curse of the fall. "What is man that You are mindful of him, and the son of man that you care for him?" Christ was made a little lower than the angels, but was crowned with glory and honor from the Father because of His obedient suffering and death on our behalf. Now we share in the glory that was His from the foundation of the world. No wonder the psalmist declares, "O LORD, our Lord, how excellent is Your name in all the earth!"

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: The Saints Share in the Blessedness of Christ.

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Apostles' Creed

Verse: Romans 10:17

Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.

Psalm 8 and/or the appointed daily psalms listed below.

Prayer on the Psalm: O Lord, Your name is excellent in all the earth for You have loved us poor and undeserving sinners with an everlasting love that moved You to give Your Son into death for our salvation. You have made us a little lower than the angels, but in Christ You have exalted us to Your right hand and given us dominion over all the works of Your hands, having put all things under our feet. For all Your exceedingly great and precious blessings we give You thanks and praise through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

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Looking forward to the Twenty-fourth Sunday after Trinity

Isaiah 51:9-16; Colossians 1:9-14; Matthew 9:18-26

A shroud of darkness engulfs us. Sin, death, and disease threaten to sever us from life's fullest measure. Without new life in Christ Jesus, there would be no light to dissipate, dispel, or curb grief and sadness. But Jesus has qualified us "to share in the inheritance of the saints of light" delivering us from the dark domain (Col. 1:9–14). "I have put my words in your mouth and covered you in the shadow of my hand, ... You are my people" (Is. 51:9–16). The presence of Christ, in word, wine, bread, and water, confronts our sinful nature with forgiveness. In the sacraments, God claims us to be His very own children, creating, and sustaining our faith. So in Christ, we humbly receive the words, "your faith has made you well" (Matt. 9:18–26). On the last day God will surely awaken us also from slumber in resurrection glory.
