A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Twenty-Fifth Sunday after Trinity November 7 through November 14, 2021

Catechesis Notes for the Week — Psalm 132: A Prayer for the Lord to Dwell with His Church—Psalm 132 begins with recalling how David would not rest until he had provided for the tabernacle of the Lord and the Ark of the Covenant where the Old Testament believers would worship and receive the Lord's saving gifts. For us in the New Testament Church, Christ is the Tabernacle of the Lord's saving presence. He promises to be found where His Word is preached, and His sacraments are administered. He has made precious promises to His holy Christian Church and to each member of the communion of saints. As the Lord was faithful to David and His place of rest in Zion, so the Lord is faithful to us. The testimony of the Lord in the Gospel of Christ is certain. His priests are clothed with His righteousness. He grants rest and refreshment to His saints who shout for joy in His presence. Like the Old Testament saints who prayed this Psalm of Ascents as they approached the Lord's tabernacle, we know that when we enter into the house of the Lord that Jesus Himself is present with His good gifts and Spirit.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: The Kingdom of God Is Hidden in the Word and Faith

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Verse: 1 Corinthians 15:22 For as in Adam all die,

Looking forward to the Twenty-sixth Sunday after Trinity

Daniel 7:9-14: Daniel sees into the future a vision of the final judgment. The glorious image of God the Father, the Ancient of Days, is seated upon His throne. "One like the Son of Man"—our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father's Son—will come with the clouds to the Ancient of Days and receive from the Father eternal glory and dominion. In that day, "all peoples, nations, and languages" will worship Christ and His kingdom will never pass away.

2 Peter 3:3-14: The Apostle Peter could not be more accurate in describing the very times in which we live. There are scoffers who think that what Christians believe concerning Christ and His Second Coming are utter nonsense. They look at how the world has continued, century after century, and they reject any notion of the existence of God or the truthfulness of Christ's promises to His Church. Peter asserts that the Word of God that brought the heavens into existence and that created and recreated the world through water will keep His promises. The eternal God of salvation has a different timetable from finite men. "With the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day." He will keep His promises to us. The world continues until just the right time of Christ's return, because He is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. Peter encourages us to "look up" and to wait patiently for Christ's return, knowing that in that day both the heavens and the earth will be transformed in which the righteousness of Christ will endure forever.

Matthew 25:31-46: Jesus gives us a picture of the last judgment. When He returns in glory with all His holy angels, He will sit upon the throne of His glory, all nations will be gathered before Him, and He will separate believers in Christ (the sheep) from unbelievers (the goats). Believers in Christ will hear the result of Christ's forgiveness that they have believed: "Come, you blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." Unbelievers, who have rejected Christ and despised His forgiveness, will hear: "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and all His angels." In the picture Jesus paints, both the sheep and the goats are shocked that Jesus draws attention to what they have or have not done. Since Christians do not trust in their works for salvation, they are shocked when Jesus refers to them in the judgment. Since unbelievers DO trust in their works, they are shocked to hear that they have done nothing deserving of salvation. Works do not save us, but they do testify to the faith of our heart. The works that are truly "good works" are those done entirely out of faith in God's mercy in Christ. These works are not produced by our own goodness or moral strength; rather, they are the fruits of God's good work of love and forgiveness that we have received. Since they are the fruits of faith—a faith that is entirely fixed upon Jesus—the believer may not even be aware of these works because his faith is fixed upon Christ for salvation. This explains their reply to Jesus in the judgment: "Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink?" From this we learn that our faith must be always fixed upon Jesus who first fed us, clothed us, and came to our aid in His work of salvation, only then will the works of faith be manifest in us.
