The Lord's Prayer: Fourth and Fifth Petitions

[Jesus] arose and went to the region of Tyre and Sidon. And He entered a house and wanted no one to know *it*, but He could not be hidden. ²⁵ For a woman whose young daughter had an unclean spirit heard about Him, and she came and fell at His feet. ²⁶ The woman was a Gentile, a Syro-Phoenician by birth, and she kept begging Him to cast the demon out of her daughter. ²⁷ But Jesus said to her, "Let the children be filled first, for it is not good to take the children's bread and throw *it* to the little dogs."

²⁸ And she answered and said to Him, "Yes, Lord, yet even the little dogs under the table eat from the children's crumbs."

²⁹ Then He said to her, "For this saying go your way; the demon has gone out of your daughter."

³⁰ And when she had come to her house, she found the demon gone out, and her daughter lying on the bed.

IV. The Lord's Prayer Teaches Us What Prayer Is: (Review)

- 1. God's Word is the foundation for prayer.
- 2. Prayer is the voice of <u>faith</u> that claims the promises of God's Word.
- 3. God's Word is what gives certainty to prayer.
- 4. Our baptism gives us the rights and privileges of a child.
- 5. Our prayers are heard for Christ's sake, not because of our merit or worthiness.

V. The Small Catechisms Explanation to the Lord's Prayer: LSB p. 324

The Fourth Petition: "Give us this day our daily bread"

- We are taught that the gifts of daily bread are a sign of God's universal grace.
- We are praying for faith to rely upon our heavenly Father for everything that we need.
- > We are taught the daily bread includes <u>everything</u> that has to do with the supports and needs of the body.

The Fifth Petition: "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

- We are taught to believe that sin is the common problem that we all have.
- We are taught that God's answer to all our prayers rests upon His grace and forgiveness that we do not deserve.
- > We are taught that our capacity to forgive and do good to others rests upon receiving God's forgiveness in faith.
- > The "And" at the beginning of the petition connects the fifth petition to the fourth: It is in the context of the things of daily bread that we experience sin's struggles.
- > The plural pronouns teach us that there is an important liturgical dimension to every petition of the Lord's Prayer.
