A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Twenty-second Sunday after Trinity November 8 through November 15, 2020

Catechesis Notes for the Week —Psalm 98 — A Psalm of Rejoicing in Christ's Salvation—Psalm 98 is a psalm that rejoices in Christ's salvation. Jesus is the Father's "right hand" and "holy arm"! He gained the victory over sin, death, and the power of Satan by His suffering and death upon the cross. In the preaching of the Gospel, "the Lord has made known His salvation" and the "righteousness" of Christ He proclaims to the nations for their salvation. By the death, resurrection, and preaching of the Gospel of Christ, the Lord openly shows His salvation to the nations and proclaims this salvation to the ends of the earth. Psalm 98 overflows with the expression of joy, singing, and joyful music in praise of the Lord whose salvation moves the earth. Even the creation is involved in the proclamation of the Gospel and in anticipation of the future coming of our Lord Jesus Christ who will "judge the earth" according to the "righteousness of His cross."

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Be of Good Cheer! I Forgive You Your Debt!

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Apostles' Creed

Verse: 1 Corinthians 12:3

No one speaking by the Spirit of God calls Jesus accursed, and no one can say that Jesus is Lord except by the Holy Spirit.

Psalm 98 and/or the appointed daily psalms listed below.

Prayer on the Psalm: O Lord, in the new song of the Gospel of Your Son, You proclaim eternal life and salvation from all sin, death, and punishment by the gift of Your grace. Forgive us our sins for Jesus' sake and grant to us the joy of Your salvation that we might joyfully shout the praises of the Lord in all the earth; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Proverbs 8:11-22: This Old Testament reading teaches us about "wisdom" and "personifies" wisdom as if he is a person. Of course, this wisdom is personified in the person of Christ. "Wisdom" has guided kings and the course of human history. At the heart of Solomon's catechesis is the assertion that "The fear of the Lord is to hate evil." This helps to define the meaning of Psalm 111:10, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom." At the heart of the fear of the Lord is "to hate evil!" This is what faith in Christ gives us. Where there is "fear of the Lord" there is "the hatred of evil" and of all that is contrary to God's Word.

Philippians 3:17-21: Paul's words condemn the power-hungry Pharisees who use the pretense of "obedience to the law" as a means to satisfy the appetites of their bellies. In place of such folly, Paul directs us to remember that our citizenship is in heaven and that we eagerly await our Savior and the resurrection of our bodies from the dead.

Matthew 22:15-22: The Pharisees did not really care about morality or doing what was right in the eyes of God. They only cared about power and influence. The Pharisees were political animals, so they questioned Jesus about whether it was lawful to pay taxes to Caesar or not. All their flattery of Jesus was nothing more than a ruse. They hated Him and they hated what He preached. Jesus out-dueled the rhetoric of the Pharisees. He perceived their wickedness. He asked to see the tax money and asked them about whose inscription appeared on the coin. It was the inscription of Caesar! All the boasting and coveting of the Pharisees for political power could not change the fact that the Romans ruled, and the Pharisees had no real power at all. How wonderful! Jesus' reply silenced them. They hoped to trap Him in a contradiction. Will He show loyalty to Rome or loyalty to the government? His answer carefully showed proper obedience to both: "Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." Matthew records that even the Pharisees who hated Jesus marveled at His words. He silenced them. He gave all honor to God at the same time He acknowledged the proper place of the civil authority. In this Gospel, Jesus shows Himself to be superior to all political authority as He gives honor and glory to God without compromise and acknowledges that God works through the civil authorities to accomplish His purposes.
