Catechesis Notes for the Week —Psalm 100—A Psalm of Thanksgiving to the Lord—Psalm 100 is a brief psalm of thanksgiving that calls upon all people to praise and give thanks to the Lord for He alone is God, we are the sheep of His pasture, He is good, and His mercy and truth is from everlasting. The familiar hymn, "All People That on Earth Do Dwell" is a devotional hymnic paraphrase of Psalm 100. It receives its hymn name from the psalm itself, "Old Hundredth." Stanza 2 confesses the truth of our creation and salvation in Christ: "Know that the Lord is God indeed; / Without our aid He did us make. / We are His folk, He doth us feed, / And for His sheep He doth us take" and the final stanza adds a hymnic version of the Gloria Patri: "To Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, / The God whom heav'n and earth adore, / From us and from the angel host / Be praise and glory evermore."

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Look Up! For Your Redemption Draws Near!

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Verse: 2 Timothy 3:15

Prayer on the Psalm: Heavenly Father, God of all grace, govern our hearts that we may never forget Your blessings but steadfastly thank and praise You for all Your goodness in this life until, with all Your saints, we praise You eternally in Your heavenly kingdom; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. The Catechism: The Lord's Prayer—Introduction and First Petition

What is the Introduction to the Lord's Prayer?	Preschool +
Our Father who art in heaven.	
What does this mean?	First Grade +
With these words God tenderly invites us to believe that He is our true Father	
and that we are His true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask Him	
as dear children ask their dear father.	
What is the First Petition?	Preschool +
Hallowed be Thy name.	
What does this mean?	Second Grade +
God's name is certainly holy in itself,	
but we pray in this petition that it may be kept holy among us also.	
How is God's name kept holy?	Third Grade +
God's name is kept holy when the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity,	
and we, as the children of God, also lead holy lives according to it.	
Help us to do this, dear Father in heaven!	
But anyone who teaches or lives contrary to God's Word profanes the name of God among us.	
Protect us from this, heavenly Father!

Amen.

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Looking forward to the First Sunday in Advent

November 29, 2020

Hymns: 332, 334, 341

Jeremiah 23:5-8: After condemning unfaithful pastors who did not warn the sheep and lead them to the promise of Christ's coming, Jeremiah begins the Old Testament reading for the First Sunday in Advent with the promise of how the Lord will raise up a faithful Shepherd from the House of David, a Branch of righteousness, and a King of ultimate wisdom and justice. That Shepherd is God's only Son, Christ the Lord. He will save His people. He will comfort and defend them. He will be called: "THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS!" There is no greater and more comforting name to describe what it is that our Lord Jesus Christ has done for us in His suffering and death upon the cross.

Romans 13:(8-10) 11-14: With every passing day, the Lord's return in glory draws nearer. The Apostle Paul calls us to awaken from the slumber of impenitence and spiritual sloth. He calls us to "cast off the works of darkness" through confession and to "put on the armor of light" by receiving afresh the Lord's forgiving Word. Only then will we be enabled to walk properly as "children of the day." Only then will we be prepared for the Lord's return. "Put on the Lord Jesus!" He IS our righteousness! "And make no provision for the flesh!"

Matthew 21:1-9: The Passover Lamb. The Son of David. The Christ. The King. The Lord. The lowly servant who rides upon a donkey as a sign that He is the Savior of sinners. Jesus is all this for you! "Hosanna to the Son of David, Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" proclaims Jesus to be everything that the Old Testament Church was looking forward to in the coming of their Messiah. The One whom they lauded and confessed as Savior when He entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday is the same Lord whose birth we prepare to celebrate, whose Word and Sacrament continue to nurture us, and whose Second Coming we look forward to with great joy and anticipation. This is Advent par excellence: penitential joy that looks forward to the gracious coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
