### The Congregation at Prayer

A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Seventh Sunday of Easter/Exaudi May 16 through May 23, 2021

Catechesis Notes for the Week — Psalm 118:1-14 — A Prayer of Rejoicing in the Confidence of Faith—Psalm 118 was prayed regularly as part of the Passover celebration. It contains the call to rejoice and give thanks for the Lord's salvation of His people. It has both a corporate and individual dimension to it. The basis for the congregation's celebration and that of every individual Christian is mercy. "Oh, give thanks to the LORD, for He is good! Because His mercy endures forever." The enduring mercy and faithfulness of the Lord is the only reason that Israel was redeemed from countless occasions of rebellion, and it is only the enduring mercy and grace of God that sustains and comforts us as individual Christians. So Psalm 118 begins with the call to the entire congregation of Israel to confess the mercy of God and then leads into a personal confession for every believer: "I called on the Lord in distress; The Lord answered me...The Lord is on my side; I will not fear. What can man do to me?... It is better to trust in the LORD than to put confidence in princes." The first half of the psalm concludes with comforting assertion: "The LORD is my strength and song, and He has become my salvation."

### The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

### Theme: Jesus Promises the Holy Spirit

#### Looking forward to the Feast of Pentecost

Genesis 11:1-9: At the Tower of Babel man's speech was confused by God because of the idolatry of man's heart. On Pentecost all confusion, disorder, envy, and pride is put to flight as the one Gospel of God's grace and salvation in Christ is proclaimed in many languages and to many peoples. The word of the Gospel restores the peace and harmony that was lost at Babel.

Acts 2:1-21: St. Luke's account of the Day of Pentecost records the signs associated with the Spirit being poured out upon the Apostles. The sound of rushing wind was a sign that the Holy Spirit was given for the sake of the preaching of the Gospel and that the Spirit blows like the wind, converting to faith when and where He pleases in those who hear the Gospel. The tongues of fire upon their heads designated these men to be the chosen and authoritative witnesses of Jesus. The Church is bound to their Word because the Apostolic Doctrine comes from the Holy Spirit. The ability to speak in foreign languages is a sign that the Gospel is for all people, of every race, tribe, nation, and language. Jonah's prophecy concerning the outpouring of the Spirit in the last days describes the entire period of the Church's life from the time of the Apostles to the Second Coming of Christ. During this period, the Holy Spirit is poured out through preaching. This preaching creates both the faith that calls upon the Lord for salvation and the hope of the glorious resurrection of the body to eternal life.

John 14:23-31: We have fellowship with the Holy Trinity through faith in Jesus and the Word of the Gospel. True faith loves Christ and all that He says. Love for Christ and His Word receives strength from the Word. Just as the Holy Spirit was sent to the apostles to bring to their remembrance everything that Jesus had taught them, so Jesus promises that the Holy Spirit is the Father's gift to us through His Word. By the Word of Jesus the Holy Spirit comes to us, imparting to us Jesus' peace—the peace of sins forgiven, peace with God, and the peace of a conscience that is free from guilt and the Law's threat of punishment. All this Jesus promises us when He says, "If anyone loves Me, he will keep [believe, trust, and depend upon] My word; and My Father will love him, and We will come to him and make Our home with him."
