Catechesis Notes for the Week — **Psalm 127: The Lord Alone Preserves the Family**—Without the Lord "building" our marriages, homes, and families by His gracious Word and Spirit we can accomplish nothing of lasting value or worth. Psalm 127 gives all glory and honor to the Lord as the one who builds, establishes, and protects our families and the city in which we dwell. Our efforts, apart from faith and prayer, accomplish nothing. "It is vain for you to rise up early, to sit up late, to eat the bread of sorrows; for so He gives His beloved sleep." This psalm of Ascent paints a beautiful picture that contrasts our striving apart from the Lord's Word and faith with the rest that the Lord alone gives to His beloved who trust in Him. Furthermore, Psalm 127 speaks against the prevailing wisdom of our age by extolling children as a precious gift from God. "Children are a heritage from the Lord…Happy is the man who has his quiver full of them." Even though God has given us work to do in our station in life, happiness, contentment, and peace comes, not from our striving, but from the gifts and provisions that Lord provides in Christ to sustain us. Those who trust in Him will never be put to shame and will triumph over their enemies.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme:

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Verse: 1 John 4:9

Amen.

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Looking forward to the Nineteenth Sunday after Trinity Hymns: 686, 708, 822, 599, 814, 922

Genesis 28:10-17: In Jacob's dream at Bethel, the Lord came to him and reaffirmed the promise of salvation through the coming Messiah: "in your seed all the families of the earth shall be blessed." This is why Jacob confessed, "Surely the Lord is in this place...How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven!" Wherever the saving Word of the Gospel is proclaimed, THERE is the very presence of the Lord Himself for the salvation of His people. The Lord's Word is our comfort too: "I am the Lord God of Abraham...I am with you and will keep you wherever you go..."

Ephesians 4:22-28: The Holy Spirit renews our faith and life in Christ through His Word of grace and mercy in Jesus. **Matthew 9:1-8:** A paralyzed man is the perfect image of humanity who cannot save itself from the bondage and paralysis of sin. The paralytic had to be brought to Jesus. We have to be brought to Jesus. His greatest problem was not physical paralysis, but the problem of sin which was the cause of all his maladies. It is the same for us. Jesus' word addressed the real problem: "Son, be of good cheer; your sins are forgiven you." It is this word that the self-righteous scribes objected to. They accused Jesus of blasphemy: using the power of God that He had no right to use. They were wrong. Jesus had the authority to forgive sins because He came into the world to pay the ultimate price for sin. The scribes had no power to make a man walk or to take away a man's sin. It was impossible for them. It is impossible for us. But Jesus had the power to do both. To teach them that He had the power to forgive sins to His Church, so that paralyzed and broken sinners might be set free and reconciled to God. "When the multitudes saw it, they marveled and glorified God, who had given such power to men." Thanks be to God that Jesus power and authority to forgive sins is found in the Church where His Gospel is preached and His sacraments are administered. In Christ's absolution, sinners are set free from bondage and reconciled to God.
