A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Reformation October 31 through November 7, 2021

Catechesis Notes for the Week — Psalm 131: A Prayer of Simple Trust in the Lord—This short psalm of Ascents speaks of the simplicity of faith, comparing the believer to a weaned child who remains dependent upon his mother. As Christians, we are to live within our vocations. We are not to think more highly of ourselves than we ought. We are not to occupy ourselves with great matters or things that are too profound for us. We are to commend ourselves and our whole life to Christ, our Lord. To live in the humility of faith is not to dictate to God what He must do, but rather to receive from Him what He gives and to hope confidently in Him.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: The Righteous Shall Live by Faith in Christ Alone!

Give me the trust of a child who trusts in his mother for everything, and teach me to hope in You from this time forth and forever; through Jesus Christ, my Lord. Amen.

Looking forward to the Twenty-fifth Sunday after Trinity

Job 14:1-6: Job presents a sober yet realistic assessment of man. We cannot determine the length of our days. Sinners cannot take away their own sin. "Who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean? No one." Our days are few in number and we are under God whether we believe in Him or not. God sets the limits of our life and the length of our days. Only He can redeem the sinner and give purpose and meaning to our lives. In humble faith we submit ourselves to Christ, our only Savior. I Thessalonians 4:13-18: Paul comforts us in the grief over the death of Christians by pointing us to the sure and certain hope of the resurrection of all the dead when Christ returns again in glory. The first to be resurrected are those Christians who have already died in the Lord. After that, those Christians who are living on earth at the time of Jesus' Second Coming will also rise to immortality and incorruption. Then we will be caught up with the Lord and ever remain with Him in His eternal comfort.

Luke 17:20-30: It is of great comfort to know that the Kingdom of God is not like any earthly kingdom that can be seen and observed with its civil rulers, great armies, or vast lands. Instead, the Kingdom of God is what Holy Scripture and the Catechism teach: "when our heavenly Father gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His Holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity." The kingdom of God is the gift of faith in Christ that is created and preserved throughout the world in the hearts of Christians, wherever the Gospel is preached and the Sacraments are administered. This kingdom can never be destroyed by the kingdoms of this world. We live in this faith and confidence and because of this we have the blessed hope in Christ's Second Coming in which the nations will all see that Jesus is Lord. In the meantime, it looks as if the Church is being destroyed. There will be persecution and suffering for the Kingdom of God, just as Jesus suffered before entering into glory. There will be false Christs and false prophets, but we are not to follow them. We follow the crucified and risen Savior. As it was in the days of Noah and Lot, so it will be before the coming of our Lord in glory. But our Lord will come again and we shall rejoice in Him whose victory upon the cross has brought resurrection and eternal life from the dead.
