A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Third Sunday of Easter/Misericordias Domini April 23 through April 30, 2023

Catechesis Notes for the Week — Jesus' Encouraging Catechesis — Our Eastertide Bible readings in the Congregation at Prayer offer to us the comforting and encouraging words of Jesus to the disciples in the Upper Room on Maundy Thursday. In these readings He prepares them for their future ministry as His apostles and offers comfort to Christians and the Church of every age as we face hardship and persecution for confessing Christ. Many of these words we know by heart: "Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me...I am the way, the truth, and the life...I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Helper...even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you...If anyone loves Me, he will keep My word; and My Father will love Him, and We will come to him and make Our home with him...the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you." (Selections are from John 14). By the ministry of the Holy Spirit, the resurrection Gospel of Jesus' peace and forgiveness is delivered to us. We are comforted and strengthened to remain faithful in our witness to Him who has given His life for us. By the testimony of the Spirit of Truth we have the assurance that we belong to Christ.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Jesus Is the Good Shepherd

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Apostles' Creed

Verse: John 11:25-26a

I am the resurrection and the life.

He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live.

And whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die.

Psalm 23 and/or the appointed daily psalms listed below.

Prayer on the Psalm: O good and faithful Shepherd, Jesus Christ, of Your infinite love You laid down Your life for us Your sheep. We give You praise and glory for Your unspeakable grace and mercy. We beseech You, feed us upon the pleasant pastures of Your Word, give us to drink of the waters of salvation, and guide us by Your Holy Spirit, that, as You know us and continually minister to our need, even so may we know You, gladly hear Your voice, and follow You through the valley of the shadow of death. Deliver us from all our foes until Your whole flock shall be gathered about You in the resurrection on the last day, for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Hymn of the Week

"If Christ Had Not Been Raised from Death" (stanzas 1-2)

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Looking forward to the Fourth Sunday of Easter/Jubilate

Isaiah 40:25-31: "But those who wait on the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint" (vs. 31). This word of God from the prophet Isaiah echoes the confession of the Apostle Paul, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). Both these passages underscore the comforting truth that the Christian's strength to be a Christian and to live faithfully and joyously in the freedom of the Gospel comes entirely from the Lord.

1 Peter 2:11-20: Peter tells us to "abstain from fleshly lusts which war against the soul." This admonition reminds us that the desires and appetites of the flesh are at enmity with faith. Just as faith is turned outward to Christ and finds its sufficiency in Him, so the flesh has a faith of its own which turns inward to every self-centered desire. Contrition and repentance, confession and absolution are our weapons against the fleshly lusts and the means by which we learn to abstain from them for the sake of our soul's salvation.

John 16:16-22: Jesus describes His suffering and death as "a little while." During this "little while" He goes to the Father to offer His lifeblood into death for our sins. This "little while" was filled with great grief for the disciples, but their sorrow was turned to joy in His resurrection from the dead. From this "little while" we learn what is characteristic for us and the Church in this world. The "little while" of Christ's suffering and the lamentation of the disciples corresponds to the "little while" of the Church's and every individual Christian's suffering because of sin and persecution. Nevertheless, this "little while" is short-lived. Our Lord is not only risen from the dead, but He comes to us with His grace and forgiveness to turn our sorrow into joy. There is joy in the Christian life now. We do not have to wait for it until the resurrection on the last day. It is a joy in the midst of the cross of affliction.
