A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Eighteenth Sunday after Trinity October 8 through October 15, 2023

Catechesis Notes for the Week — We Bear Witness Through Our Infirmity — "God has chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise" I Corinthians 1:27. "Unless we are weak Christ cannot exercise His strength on us. If it were our strength and power with which we resist our enemies, we should have the glory and not Christ. But experience teaches us that we are not such as can help themselves, but God must do it. Thus God is glorified in our infirmity. The Lord Christ comforts us in that we know for certain that at times we shall be weak while our enemies are strong and boastful, but Christ wins the victory in the end. Thus God deals with us when we ourselves and all that we stand for are yielding and going to pieces before the world, when we are outwardly weak in the eyes of the world, or when each single Christian is hard-pressed, so that we are not afraid or dispirited. Here we learn that our Lord God does not jest when He feigns to be weak, but is in earnest, for He will cast down the mighty through the weak and will exalt the weak. But we must not look upon these things with the eyes of worldly reason, as is generally done, or we shall be lost. We must know that it is God's will to overcome the mighty through the weak. We must believe this and straightway shut our eyes." — Martin Luther

### Looking forward to the Nineteenth Sunday after Trinity

Hymns: 885 (1-4), 708, 610, 620, 814, 748, 885 (5-8)

Genesis 28:10-17: In Jacob's dream at Bethel, the Lord came to him and reaffirmed the promise of salvation through the coming Messiah: "in your seed all the families of the earth shall be blessed." This is why Jacob confessed, "Surely the Lord is in this place...How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven!" Wherever the saving Word of the Gospel is proclaimed, THERE is the very presence of the Lord Himself for the salvation of His people. The Lord's Word is our comfort too: "I am the Lord God of Abraham...I am with you and will keep you wherever you go..."

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Ephesians 4:22-28: The Holy Spirit renews our faith and life in Christ through His Word of grace and mercy in Jesus.

Matthew 9:1-8: A paralyzed man is the perfect image of humanity who cannot save itself from the bondage and paralysis of sin. The paralytic had to be brought to Jesus. We have to be brought to Jesus. His greatest problem was not physical paralysis, but the problem of sin which was the cause of all his maladies. It is the same for us. Jesus' word addressed the real problem: "Son, be of good cheer; your sins are forgiven you." It is this word that the self-righteous scribes objected to. They accused Jesus of blasphemy: using the power of God that He had no right to use. They were wrong. Jesus had the authority to forgive sins because He came into the world to pay the ultimate price for sin. The scribes had no power to make a man walk or to take away a man's sin. It was impossible for them. It is impossible for us. But Jesus had the power to do both. To teach them that He had the power to forgive sins, He made the man to arise and walk. What none of us could do, Jesus did. He has now given the power to forgive sins to His Church, so that paralyzed and broken sinners might be set free and reconciled to God. "When the multitudes saw it, they marveled and glorified God, who had given such power to men." Thanks be to God that Jesus power and authority to forgive sins is found in the Church where His Gospel is preached and His sacraments are administered. In Christ's absolution, sinners are set free from bondage and reconciled to God.
