A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity October 5 through October 12, 2025

The First Article of the Creed and the Historical Account of Creation in Genesis — The Bible verse for this week teaches us that all of creation came into existence by the Word of God and that apart from God's Word nothing exists. The stories of the creation of the heavens and the earth move quickly to the creation of man as the crown of God's creation and the object of God's greatest affection and love. Though man squandered God's free gifts in the creation, God did not abandon His affection and love for us. The story of man's fall into sin is quickly followed by God's first promise of salvation from the devil and the condemnation that this fall brought upon us. This promise is contained in God's Word to the devil: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise His heel." The "Seed of the Woman" is the Virgin-born Son of God who crushed the devil's claim upon man when His heel was bruised in His suffering and death upon the cross. This promise of salvation is also accompanied by God's curse of the fall. The curse of the fall was necessary in order that sinful man might come to believe in his need for God. The curse of the fall gives the preaching of the Law its teeth. The Law preaches repentance—revealing the sin and rebellion from which we need God's salvation—and the experience of the curse of the fall teaches us that the problem of sin is real and has separated us from God. It is in this context of the Law's preaching and the experience of our fallen condition that the Gospel enters in to bring forgiveness and comfort, and to raise us up to the new life of faith. By faith in Christ and the promises of salvation through Him, we are enabled to bear up under the curse of the fall until we are delivered from all the suffering of our fallen condition on the last day in the resurrection of the dead.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: Jesus Restores the Dead to Life!

Invocation

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Apostles' Creed

Verse: Psalm 33:6

By the word of the LORD the heavens were made, and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth.

Psalm 30 and/or the appointed daily psalms listed below.

Prayer on Psalm 30: O Lord, my faithful God and Savior Jesus Christ, You have never failed to defend, help, and rescue me from my enemies and even the failings of my own making. Work in me daily contrition and repentance, that fleeing from self-reliance I might depend upon You alone for deliverance and rejoice daily in the joy of Your salvation; for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Proverbs 25:6-14: Solomon's wise sayings reflect, in concrete ways, what living by faith in the Gospel of Christ looks like. We do not exalt ourselves; we live in humility toward one another; we take up grievances with the person with whom we have a concern; and we guard our tongues from gossip and slander. All this is but a reflection of how God in Christ treats us.

Ephesians 4:1-6: To be a disciple of the Lord Jesus means that we walk through our life by faith in Him. Paul exhorts the Ephesian Christians to "have a walk worthy of the calling" of the Gospel that they have received. Such a "walk" is characterized by humble reliance upon the Gospel by which we are able to bear one another's burdens with all longsuffering. The "unity of the Spirit" is a reference to holding fast to the common confession of Christian doctrine: There is one body and one Spirit… one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all."

Luke 14:1-11: How wonderful it is to see Jesus entering into the homes of those who did not believe in Him! The Pharisees rejected Jesus' mercy for those they deemed unworthy, but that did not prevent Jesus from reaching out to them. In this Gospel, Jesus went into the house of one of the rulers of the Pharisees for dinner on the Sabbath. It appears from the testimony of St. Luke as if nearly everyone was against Him. They watched Him closely to see what He would say or do that they might trap Him in His words or actions. It is worth noting that Jesus does not apologize to them for any way He might have offended them. Instead, He calls them to repentance for their self-righteousness by asking them a question that illuminates the purpose of the Sabbath: to give the rest, peace, and salvation that only God can give. This is why the Old Testament believers were called to "stop working" on the Sabbath, so that God might work in them. So, He asks, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath?" But they kept silent. Jesus answers His own question by healing the man and setting him free. That is what the Sabbath is all about: God doing good works for our life and salvation! Then Jesus further illustrates His point by asking another question, "Which of you, having a donkey or an ox that has fallen into a pit, will not immediately pull him out on the Sabbath?" But still, they could not answer. It often takes much preaching and prayer to break through the hardened heart of a self-righteous sinner.

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
