For the Week of the Fifth Sunday after Pentecost
June 28 through July 5, 2026*

Catechesis Notes for the Week— To Love Christ Above All Things — Jesus’ words are jarring: “He who loves father or mother more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he who loves son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he who does not take his cross and follow after Me is not worthy of Me. He who finds his life will lose it, and he who loses his life for My sake will find it” (Matthew 10:37-39). Is Jesus denying the obligations of the Fourth Commandment? No! Is He urging us to abandon our sons or daughters? No! Instead, Jesus is confessing that He alone is our God—our Creator and our Savior. If we let go of Christ, then we have nothing! Our lives and our salvation are entirely gifts of God through Christ. Apart from Him we do not exist, and apart from Him we cannot be saved. Jesus’ catechesis distinguishes between the First Commandment and the Fourth Commandment. The Fourth Commandment is the first commandment under the Second Table of the Law and clearly sets up the authority of father and mother, and their obligation to care for their children and their children to honor them, as foundational for all human relationships. But the First Commandment, “You shall have no other gods” is greater because Christ is the source of everything. The Gospel of God’s love in Christ creates the faith that the First Commandment demands. And the miracle of faith is that he who loves Christ above all things loves father and mother, son and daughter in the best possible way.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Theme: To Love Christ above All Things!

Looking forward to the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost (Proper 9)

July 5, 2026

Zechariah 9:9-12: *If you had been among those who were waiting in humble faith for the coming of the long-expected Messiah, and it had been announced to you, “HE HAS COME!” you would have rejoiced with exceedingly great joy! The Prophet Zechariah foretold the coming of Christ into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, “Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your King is coming to you; He is just and having salvation, lowly and riding on a donkey, a colt, the foal of a donkey...He shall speak peace to the nations!” The announcement made through the prophet not only pertains to the historical events of Christ’s birth and triumphal entry into Jerusalem, but it also pertains to us now! “Rejoice, greatly! Shout for joy! Your Savior comes to you now to forgive your sins, to comfort you in sorrow, and to give you a hope that cannot be shaken!” By His Word and Sacrament He rides into our midst to lift the burdens of troubled hearts.*

Romans 7:14-25a: *Paul’s catechesis on the baptismal life continues with a discussion of the ongoing problem of sin’s corruption that continues to adhere within the Christian. Although we confess correctly that our sins are forgiven and Christ has taken our sin away, nevertheless the problem of sin’s corruption remains within the Christian. Paul calls this being “carnal” or “fleshly” – his use of the term “carnal” is a reference to the ongoing problem of sin that will not be removed from our bodies until the resurrection. We can relate to Paul’s confession, “I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) nothing good dwells; for to will is present with me, but how to perform what is good I do not find. For the good that I will to do, I do not do; but the evil I will not to do, that I practice.” This does not mean that we are to rejoice in being sinful, or that we are to indulge the appetites of our flesh. But rather, it means that the struggle with sin remains because we are joined to Christ who bore our sin in His body, so that we might learn through this struggle ever deeper reliance upon His grace.*

Matthew 11:25-30: *The sweetness and precious comfort of the Gospel is what Jesus is referring to when He prays, “I thank You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because You have hidden these things from the wise and prudent and have revealed them to babes...” Let us be babes in Christ, receiving His good gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation! To know the Son is to know the Father and God’s heart of love for the brokenhearted and those who are tormented by the struggle with sin. Therefore Jesus invites us, “Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light!”*
